Hurry... the deadline to register for Peace Camp 2009 "Giraffe Heroes - Stick Your Neck Out" is June 1....

Just in case you haven't already heard... we are registering campers and recruiting volunteers for this year's Peace Camp. Peace Camp is the St. Andrew's version of Vacation Bible School. We start the evening with a gathering in the sanctuary that includes an introduction and music. The children are then grouped according to age and rotate through the other activities with their guides or "shepherds". Activities include stories, crafts, and outdoor recreation. Each child receives a T-shirt. Snacks after outdoor fun are yummy sno-cones. The camp runs Sunday, June 7, to Thursday, June 11, 6:30 to 8 pm for children ages 4 years old to those finishing the 4<sup>th</sup> grade and going into 5<sup>th</sup> grade. The registration fee is \$15 - 1, \$25 - 2, \$38 - 3, and \$50 - 4 per family.

Dear Church Family & Friends,

We have all been faced with the challenge of needing medical care when it is after office hours or the weekend and our regular practitioner is off. If it is a true emergency, i.e. chest pain, trauma, sudden loss of vision, slurred speech, weakness, mental confusion, compromised breathing, etc., calling 911 and going to the emergency room is always the best option. Care for these types of symptoms needs to be swift and efficient and is best performed in a hospital emergency room.

However, when you have a cut that might need stitching, a sore throat, flu symptoms, earache, a suspected bladder or sinus infection, animal or insect bite, etc. and you are unable to see your primary practitioner...does that automatically require a trip to the ER?

It is recommended that you first try to call your practitioner for advice. This is especially important if you have a chronic medical condition like heart, kidney, lung disease or diabetes. Oftentimes, practitioners are recommending urgent care centers for treating basic medical needs when their office is closed. Urgent care centers are well staffed with physicians and nurse practitioners who can perform health screenings and assessments. Many facilities are able to obtain x-rays, lab work and suture wounds. They are generally efficient in how they see patients and the cost can be as much as 80% less than the ER. That is huge!

Having a list of your basic health info with you when you visit a hospital or urgent care center will aid in the efficiency and effectiveness of your care. The basics include: name and phone number of your primary care provider, insurance coverage, medical history and conditions, current medications and drug allergies.

Although these centers are efficient, convenient and cost effective, they are not meant to be used for all of your medical needs. Having a relationship with a primary care practitioner is still the best way to manage your general health. Remember to keep your practitioner informed of a visit to an urgent care center or the ER so that they can continue to effectively care for you. Please stop by the Health Ministry bulletin board in June and pick up listings of some of the urgent care centers that serve our area.

Through April we continue to experience a positive cash flow resulting in an increase in cash of \$8,690.81 year-to-date. As the report indicates cash on hand at the end of April was \$107,986.86. While income was a little over \$5,000 below budgeted levels, total expenses were some \$21,000 below budgeted levels. Some expenses will be incurred later in the fiscal year which will bring expenses more in line with budget expectations

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## *Stewardship of Time and Talent*

### *Where do I start???*

This month we are focusing on another kind of stewardship - the Stewardship of Time and Talent. Many, many of you are already serving in a variety of ways. And some of you might be looking for an opening, a place to begin contributing your time and talent.

In 1<sup>st</sup> Corinthians 12, the Apostle Paul calls the church the *Body of Christ*. Each part of that body has a unique function, just as every church community member does. We *each* have a Spiritual Gift to use in cooperation with others. We can be more effective when we recognize both our own gifts *and* the gifts of others. Just as the body needs hands, feet, minds, lungs – the church community needs teachers, leaders, encouragers, and helpers.

One person said, “I’d like to help out, but I don’t know where to start.” Here are *three tools* for you to use: the Ministry Assessment, the Ministry Opportunity Catalog, and the Ministry Interview.

The *first tool*, the *Ministry Assessment*, is included in the *Ministry Opportunity Catalog*. It can help you think about your availability, interests, and Spiritual Gifts. A friend looked over this list of Spiritual Gifts and said, “I don’t think I have a Spiritual Gift!” She couldn’t see it in herself, but knowing her well, *I* could see her Spiritual Gifts. So, visiting with a friend may help.

The *second tool* is the *Ministry Opportunity Catalog*, a *first attempt* to list *all* of St. Andrew’s volunteer positions. Looking it over might create a *spark*. These are available in the foyer, or I can send it by email.

The *third tool* could be called a *Ministry Interview*. You are invited to visit with me or Lyn Whitcomb to talk about your availability, your interests, your skills and gifts, and about the needs of the community.

Now, we know that because of life’s circumstances, *some* are at a time when they can be of service, and *others* are at a time when *even attendance* is difficult. Factors such as health, family responsibilities, employment situation, and distance from church influence the amount and type of service that one is able to give. So, the Session is seeking ways to invite everyone to participate *as they are able*.

If you are in a position to *start* a conversation about what you might like to do and where you might like to serve, contact me or Lyn Whitcomb at church or by phone or email. You may also note “volunteer” and your contact information on the Friendship Pad on Sunday. We will try to match your time, gifts and abilities with the needs of the community.

Robert Jensen will be reading from All My Bones Shake: Seeking a Progressive Path to the Prophetic Voice, on Tuesday, June 9, 7 pm, at BookPeople, 603 N. Lamar. Robert Jensen, a member of St. Andrew's, longtime activist fighting for women's rights, racial equality, and global justice, reveals with this book the emotional journey that brought him back to the church after an entire adulthood of religious indifference. Our world is perched on the verge of chaos, he warns. As political, economic, cultural, and ecological crises peak, the decisions we make are likely to have permanent consequences for our future and for the fate of our planet. In our nation, what underlies this chaos is a spiritual unrest, a stubborn conflict that has gotten in the way of understanding and slowed theological progress to a glacial crawl. Drawing on the Old and New Testaments, contemporary philosophy, common sense, personal intuition, and progressive politics, he offers a full defense of his conclusion, holding its consistency up to the best of religious and secular teachings. A touchingly open memoir that is also a study of the religious debate in America, All My Bones Shake marks an entirely new communion: a way to look at religion as a tool with which we may create closer ties to all humanity and begin to create a just and sustainable society—to face with confidence the uncertainty of our lives. Both political and spiritual, radical and universal, public and very personal, Jensen's warmhearted text is a passionate testament to the potential of religion to offer sanity and stability in the face of our culture's growing turmoil.

# May Session Summary

Martha Rogers, Volunteer Coordinator for St. Andrew's, was a guest attendee at the Session Meeting. She indicated that the publicity to attract additional volunteers has already encouraged six new persons to participate. She proposed placing an appropriate part of the Ministry Opportunity Catalog on our web site, to which the Session agreed. It describes volunteer opportunities as provided by the AGAPE and Community Teams and will be kept current as opportunities change. This Stewardship of Time and Talent is part of the overall stewardship theme of Faithful Living, Grateful Giving.

Randy Cook reported that the cash flow is still positive. This is partly the result of expenses being significantly less than budget, some of which are projected to be spent later in the year. Nevertheless, he said that our financial position is healthy. Randy further reported the intention of the Guardian Team to initiate a financial review of procedures and internal controls in the late summer of this year. This would be conducted by church members with expertise in finance but would be independent of the Treasurer or Guardian Team.

David Marks, Children's Christian Education Director, discussed the possibility of a more effective division of age grouping for the Godly Play program in the Fall. He also discussed a Human Sexuality Curriculum being used by the UCC and UU denominations and the possibility of some of our adults attending a teacher orientation session of one of the churches which will use the curriculum. Cliff Tyllick was complimented for the design of the Peace Camp (VBS) registration and volunteer part of the website.

The nominating committee, which will select persons to be nominated as Elders beginning 2010 will begin meeting next month. Session members who will serve on the committee were selected. The Leadership Retreat date and place were decided; it will be held on November 7 (14<sup>th</sup> as alternate date) hopefully at Alma de Mujer.

St. Andrew's has been asked by Faith PC(USA), Austin, to initiate an overture to the 2010 General Assembly to complement the one they are presenting, regarding defining marriage as between "couples" rather than between "a man and a woman". Alternatively, your Session decided to support them with an Amicus Brief on their overture and consider offering our own overture concerning the freedom to use appropriate but inclusive gender language in membership and ordination vows. A group of Session members was selected to consider the wording of our overture, which would be presented to our next Session meeting on June 23. The next Mission Presbytery meeting is June 12 and 13 in Kerrville; our commissioners will be Babs Miller and Tonya Hiland with Peggy Rackley as alternate.

# Ambassador Team



St. Andrew's will host the screening of the documentary **Capitalism Hits the Fan** featuring University of Massachusetts economist, Richard Wolff, on Sunday, **June 7**, at 12:15 pm.

In this new documentary Wolff breaks down the root causes of today's economic crisis, showing how it was decades in the making and reflects seismic failures within the structures of American-style capitalism itself. Wolff traces the source of the economic crisis to the 1970s, when wages began to stagnate and American workers got caught in a spiral of borrowing and debt that ultimately exploded in the mortgage meltdown. By placing the crisis within this larger context, Wolff argues that the proposed government bailouts, stimulus packages, and calls for increased market regulation will not be enough to address the real causes of the crisis; in the end, far more fundamental change will be necessary to avoid future catastrophes. Illustrated with motion graphics and charts, the film is designed to help ordinary citizens understand the unraveling economic crisis.

Capitalism Hits the Fan is distributed by the Media Education Foundation, <http://www.mediaed.org>. The event is free and open to the public.

Everyday Life

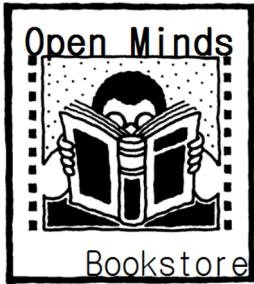
Theology in Everyday Life meets at 7:15 pm on the first and third Monday's of the month. The meeting starts on time and ends at 8:30 pm.

**Sabbath: Finding Rest, Renewal and Delight in Our Busy Lives** by Wayne Muller, \$14 A wise treatment of stress, this book gives permission to slow down from the busyness of our lives to rest, reflect and appreciate. All of us need to heed this wisdom. If we don't take care of ourselves in this way, we will not be equipped to give to others.

**Awareness, The Perils and Opportunities of Reality**, Anthony de Mello, \$13 Anthony de Mello was a Jesuit priest known throughout the world for his writings and spiritual conferences. In *Awareness*, de Mello mixes Christian spirituality, Buddhist parables, Hindu breathing exercises, and psychological insight in words of hope that come together in a grand synthesis. In short chapters, perfect for reading in quiet moments, de Mello encourages us to become aware of our submerged feelings and not let them rule us but instead allow this new awareness to change us. This is the key to courage, to taking risks, and to becoming alive to the needs and potential of others.

**How to Believe**, Jon Spayde. \$20. Included are chapters on our own Jim Rigby and Gerald Gafford. There are a few copies of this book in the bookstore.

**The Gnostic Gospels**, Elaine Pagel, \$11.50. Using the texts found at Nag Hamadi and historical data, Pagel writes with concise clarity about one of the earliest Christian sects. This provocative book explores the world of the early church and probes both Orthodox and Gnostic views of God, the Church, and Jesus.
